

## South Devon UTC Trust Pupil Premium 2016-17

The Department for Education (DfE) provide part of a school's funding to target disadvantaged students. This funding is to be used by the school at their discretion to assist disadvantaged students progress as well as those students who are deemed "not disadvantaged".

Disadvantaged students are defined as students who:

- Have been in receipt of free school meals (FSM) in the last 6 years.
- Have been, or are being looked after by the local authority for 1 day or more.
- Have been, or are a child of service personnel at any time the in the last 4 years.

South Devon UTC Trust will facilitate a transition to the sixth form bursary scheme if your child's originating school, or if your child is with us and we, have been claiming Pupil Premium Funding.

Senior Leaders at South Devon UTC will:

- Maintain a high level of expectation and aspiration for all students regardless of their background.
- Ensure the Pupil Premium Funds are deployed to enable disadvantaged students to experience at least the same rates of progress as non-disadvantaged pupils.

Curriculum Teams will:

- Track pupil progress through effective data collection to ensure timely interventions are planned that support disadvantaged pupils to increase their rates of progress.
- Supporting each other to ensure effective strategies are used in the classroom to accelerate the progress of disadvantaged students.

Teachers, Learning Company Tutors and Support Staff will:

- Deliver learning experiences that will engage and develop students academically, technically and with regards to employability.

Governors will:

- Hold Senior Staff to account for the progress of disadvantaged students.
- Monitor the impact of pupil premium funding.
- Have disadvantaged students as a focused agenda item at all Full Governing Body Meetings.

At South Devon UTC we place a very high importance on giving disadvantaged students the opportunities to progress that they would otherwise not receive. We have a designated Senior Leader with responsibility for disadvantaged students, this is our Assistant Principal. We analyse carefully consistently and constantly to ensure the funds are allocated appropriately.

Further to this there is the Adoption Premium – this is for students adopted from local authority care either on or after 30/12/2005.

#### Impact of pupil premium.

Our first set of exam results indicate that students in receipt of pupil premium perform ahead of their counterparts. Our pupil premium students performed above in the P8 measure by +0.3.

This goes alongside the students being able to access careers advice and guidance for their futures that exceeds that received in mainstream schools.
